

BIOLOGY TEACHER TRAINING

EcoPeace leads an annual three-day training for Biology and Environmental Science teachers that concentrates on working with EcoPeace's curriculum in the classroom and facilitating a deeper understanding of our cross-border environmental work, especially on issues surrounding transboundary water use and misuse and the cooperative solutions needed to address them.



The program enhances the educators' ability to teach the EcoPeace "Water and Climate and Change in the Middle East" curriculum through visits to illustrative locations including:

- the Jordan River rewilding project
- Naharayim and the Peace Island
- Alexander stream
- Waste water treatment plants

SHARED SEA TEACHER TRAINING

EcoPeace leads an annual training to introduce local teachers to its "ShaRED Sea" curriculum, which focuses on reducing harm to marine life and biodiversity in the Red Sea. Using high-quality educational methods, the program fosters environmental responsibility and cooperation between Eilat (Israel) and Aqaba (Jordan).

The program provides teachers with the theoretical and practical background necessary to facilitate marine ecology education in the classroom. It also aims to encourage environmental activism among students and the broader Red Sea community, promoting sustainable marine conservation efforts.



CLIMATE & WATER DIPLOMACY

This three-day training equips English teachers in Israel's high school "diplomacy track" with tools to incorporate EcoPeace's curriculum on environmental diplomacy and cross-border water cooperation into their classrooms. Through interactive sessions, teachers gain insights into the role of diplomacy and negotiation in addressing water-related challenges.



Participants engage in:

- lectures by leading experts
- field trips
- interactive simulations designed to enhance understanding of environmental issues

They also take part in discussions with professionals from academia, government, and civil society organizations, ultimately helping them to foster critical thinking and negotiation skills among their students.
